**Medical certificate
Issued for use in connection with an application for compensation under the State
Compensation to Victims of Crime Act**

This information is obtained pursuant to section 14(1) of the State Compensation to Victims of Crime (Consolidation) Act No. 688 of 28 June 2004.

The certificate should be completed in generally comprehensible designations of diseases, anatomical facts, etc., unless particular reasons make it inappropriate. Please refer to Executive Order No. 212 of 20 June 1935 on General Rules for Issuing Medical Certificates. The medical certificate must be based on an examination of the victim.

Please use typescript or block letters. The form can also be downloaded from the website of the Criminal Injuries Compensation Board, www.erstatningsnaevnet.dk.

1. When and how did the injury occur according to the victim?	
2. Which medical treatment has the victim undergone as a consequence of the injury?	
3. Please specify name and occupation of any other therapist to whom the victim has been referred (physiotherapist, psychologist, etc.).

5. Does the victim still suffer from the consequences of the injury?

Sections 3 and 4 of Executive Order No. 212 of 20 June 1935:

"3. In medical certificates issued for the use of persons or institutions that cannot be presumed to have medical knowledge, Danish or at least generally comprehensible designations of diseases, anatomical facts, etc., must be used as far as possible, unless particular reasons make it inappropriate.

4. The details of the certificate must be adequate and clear so as to fulfil the purpose of the certificate and enable the intended recipient of the certificate to form his or her own opinion.

The certificate must clearly state which of the details of the certificate are based on the doctor's own examination or observation of the patient, and which are based on statements from the patient or a third party or on case notes, etc.

The certificate must state the date of the doctor's last personal examination of the patient. If no personal examination has been made, this must be explicitly stated."
